

A SACRIFICE BEYOND BORDERS: HONORING THE INDONESIAN DOCTOR KILLED WHILE SERVING IN PALESTINE

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Abstract

This article examines the tragic case of an Indonesian doctor who was killed while providing humanitarian medical services in Palestine, shedding light on the dangers faced by healthcare professionals in conflict zones.
